DCs Did You Know?

Insurance - one of the most important items required for all pony club events. Please remember the following:

- This must be done prior to using the facility to ensure insurance coverage is in place
- o Every date the facility will be used must be listed
- o This is done online through the USPC website
- Dates can be added as the year progresses to each individual entry and new locations can be added
- Insurance is required for ALL pony club meetings, certifications, rallies, field trips, etc. Insurance is valid for the event only - not driving to and from.
- If non-members are participating, the special insurance is required and non-member activity forms need to be signed
- Remember to include any Horsemasters events as well if they are separate from club events
- It's time to send the IRS 1099 forms for all individuals that were paid \$600 or more in the previous calendar year. All forms must be sent prior to January 31st.
- Cash Receipts and Disbursements are due by <u>Feb 15th</u> to the National Office – please email a copy to Katie Fite for the Region file.

Horse Management Monthly

Proper Saddle Fitting:

Saddle Placement. Make sure the saddle is not sitting to far forward on your horse. It should sit behind the back of the shoulder blade with enough clearance for your horse's shoulder blades.

Tree. You want to make sure you have the correct tree size that will fit your horse's build. If it is to narrow it will pinch your horse and if it is too wide it won't provide enough clearance for your horse's withers. You also want to be sure the angle of the tree matches the slope of your horse's shoulders.

Contact. With one hand on the top of the saddle you should be able to use your other hand and run it from the entrance of the tree down to the bottom of the flap feeling consistent contact all the way down. Make sure to check both sides on your horse.

Balanced saddle, leveled seat. The saddle should not rock up and down when pressure is applied to the pommel and cantle.

Wither and Spine Clearance. There should be ample space between your horse's withers and the front of the saddle, so that the saddle is not sitting directly on the withers. The gullet should clear the entire length of the spine by a couple inches and make sure the gullet lines up with your horse's topline.

Saddle Length. Having the correct length of saddle for your seat as well as taking into account the length of your horse's back is very important. Your saddle should not go past your horse's last rib. If it does, it begins to sit on the lumbar section of the back, which is the weakest part of your horse's back. Typically you would like to have around two inches between the back of your saddle and the last rib.

After checking these factors, ride your horse and pay attention to your horse's response to the saddle. We all know how honest a horse can be when they feel something they don't like. With a good fitting saddle, the horse should move freely and calmly in the saddle and the rider should feel balanced. Look for signs or behavior issues that may stand out if the saddle does not fit correctly such as pinning ears back, biting at saddle, girthy, hard to relax, travels hollow backed, and worsens the longer you ride. These are just a few examples; pay close attention to your horse in case these behaviors arise. Of course, if these odd behaviors arise and you find that your saddle fits great you may need to consult your veterinarian or farrier to look into other issues unrelated to your saddle fitting.
